### ABOUT:

William J. Bullock expertly marries Gregorian chant with verses from Renaissance master Tomás Luis de Victoria in this arrangement, ideal for experienced church choirs. His own translations of Victoria's verses make the Latin Vesper hymn's message accessible for English speakers.

#### FROM THE COMPOSER:

Victoria's motet was composed some 400 years ago, and the Gregorian chant it is based upon is 700-years older still. Set to the quintessential advent text, it introduces the first stage of the Christmas story by molding variously ornamented versions of its chant source into four simultaneously sounding voice parts (soprano, alto, tenor, bass). Varied fragments of the chant's four phrases resound among the parts, unifying the work's metrically diverse texture into a coherent whole. Victoria was a master of this Renaissance compositional style.
